Beginning Dec 1st 2024, Cities must report cybersecurity incidents to the State.


LMC Interpretation

- Presently, some (potentially many) incidents go undetected/unreported.
- New reporting requirements will increase pressure to investigate and report.
- Reporting levels and incident totals will increase as government entities:
 - Become familiar with new reporting requirements.
 - Better understand what constitutes a reportable incident.
- In the future, the scope of the problem will be better understood with statewide monitoring data.

Cybersecurity Claims 2012 - 2023



Member Entities Lack Baseline Cybersecurity Controls

Cyber-Insurance Coverage Level	Meets Baseline Criteria	Does Not Meet Baseline Criteria
Standard Coverages (1015 Entities)	37%	<mark>63%</mark>
Enhanced Coverages (200 Entities)	62%	38%

Data from LMCIT renewal applications indicate that entities often lack one or more of eight baseline technical & administrative controls.





Improving Local Government Cyber Posture

- State supported grant program to provide \$25k-\$1M grants for under-resourced cities to increase baseline cyber posture
- Eligible expenditures include most common areas where cities lack including hardware, software, managed IT and email services etc.
- Make the State Whole-of-State Cybersecurity Plan go further
